3. What action(s) are you planning to take, and are they realistic in the time you have (Sept-Dec)?

I will draw on data collected from focus group discussions and supporting text throughout November. I understand not all tutors will be available at one time so there could be two or multiple focus group sessions throughout November.

During December I will then create a digitally accessible and evolving guide/database using the data collected from the focus groups.

I will involve the BA Illustration and Visual Media team within a focus group, as this is where the main source of data and research will come from. The focus group will explore tutors' differing outlooks, experiences, and observations surrounding manga and anime. Participants will also complete a short questionnaire to capture individual perspectives that may not surface in the focus group discussions. All tutors come from diverse backgrounds and practices which will help diversify data collection.

At this current moment, no students will be involved.

I will remain aware of my own biases when interpreting tutors' knowledge about manga and anime. My perceptions may not accurately reflect their understanding or experiences, and I must approach the inquiry with openness and humility. I will engage in reflexive practice throughout the research process, acknowledging that my role as both colleague and researcher may influence the responses and dynamics within the study.

I will record the focus group session, making sure all participants have given me permission and consent in recording and using data provided.

There will be two methods of data collection: 1. A focus group 2. Questionnaires for each participant. When phrasing questions or prompts, I will take care to use respectful and inclusive language that does not imply any deficit in participants' professional practice or knowledge.

Because manga and anime sometimes explores mature or problematic themes, such as violence, gender stereotyping, or sexualised imagery, it is essential to anticipate possible discomfort among participants. If I consider including such examples, they will be introduced through a critical and academic lens. Participants will be informed in advance about any potentially sensitive content and will be free to decline engaging with particular materials or discussions.

In facilitating focus groups, I will ensure that confidentiality and respect are maintained. Ground rules will be agreed at the beginning of the session, and while individual comments will be anonymised in reporting, participants will be reminded that complete confidentiality within the group cannot be fully guaranteed. Finally, participants will be offered a summary of findings or access to the resulting resource as a form of transparency and reciprocity.

Voluntary participation will be secured through informed consent. Personal information and responses will remain confidential and anonymised in all documentation and reporting. Any focus group discussions will be conducted in a professional and inclusive environment where all voices are valued.

All participation will be voluntary, and individuals will have the right to withdraw at any point without consequence.
